

Purana Qila: A City of Stories, Fusion and Foundation of Modern Delhi

05 November 2022

SC HTV organized a heritage walk at Purana Qila in Delhi as part of the India@75 Masterplan initiative. Located on the eastern outskirts of Delhi along the Yamuna River, the walk covered Purana Qila, which was known as Delhi's sixth city and serves as a fusion point and the foundation of modern Delhi. It is also associated with Indraprastha, a region famous in the Hindu epic Mahabharata. Dr. Harsh Pathak, a legal counsel by profession with a keen interest in natural, cultural and historical heritage and ICOMOS India member, led the dialogue. The walk's main goal was to increase public awareness of Delhi's 6th Historic City among residents and visitors (Dinpanah-Purana Qila).

Such heritage walks encourage us to think about our rich culture and history, as well as the existence of each historical structure and location. It also helps to draw authorities' attention to the deteriorating conditions of heritage sites, promoting their management and restoration.



New Delhi never leaves me any scope of comparing it to my city of Mumbai. The grandeur, the charm, the attributes of power dynamics, the charismatic leadership in the past and overall, the monuments, which makes it a special city. Identification of the Potential World Heritage Sites in North East India

08 October 2022

Jointly organized by North-East Zone in collaboration with NSC Theophilos, NSC Cultural Landscapes, and NSC ICH & EPWG, the webinar was moderated by Ar. Shubhru Gupta. The welcome speech was delivered by Er. Dilip Changkakoty, NE Zone Representative and the opening address was delivered by Dr. Rima Hooja, Vice-President, ICOMOS India.

The webinar covered following topics:

- (i) The special nature of the North East India its geographical, social and developmental context
- (ii) Overview of the potential world heritage of North East India
- (iii) Sacred groves of Meghalaya: bio-cultural cities that need global recognition
- (iv) Special typology of the NE India- The Sattras
- (v) Special typology of the NE India Jing Kieng Jri or the Living Root Bridges of Meghalaya.

The panel of speakers included Dr. M. Satish Kumar, Queen's University, UK; Dr. Sanjib Kumar Borkakoti, Expert Member, ICICH; Dr. Debojyoti Das, AHRC-GCRF Postdoctoral Associate, Bristol University, UK, Ar. Krittika Mohan, Member, NE Zone, Ar. Vidisha Barwal, member, North Zone, ICOMOS India & Ar. Sanjeev Shankar, from Meghalaya. The webinar was followed by a discussion which was chaired by Prof. GSV Suryanarayana Murthy, Cocoordinator, NSC CL. HERITAGE WALK@75: ICOMOS INDIA & HERITAGE OF BELGAUM

New Tilakwadi Heritage Walk

09 October 2022

New Tilakwadi Heritage Walk organized by Heritage of Belgaum in collaboration with ICOMOS India explored the neighbourhood of Tilakwadi which started taking shape in the 1930s but also has one of India's 4 smallpox vaccine institutes set up in 1904.

The neighbourhood has a mix of some finest Art Deco bungalows, Anglo-Indian houses but also modest bungalows set amidst huge fruiting trees. This walk explored the neighborhood of Tilakwadi which started taking shape in the early 20th century when the Independence movement was picking up and so was trade and building activity. The road names, the bungalow typologies, symbolic representation of political inclinations, and artists during the independence movement, were very much a part of the built fabric which contributes to the story of Tilakwadi.

The participants were invited to see one of the early Art Deco houses of Belgaum where we saw the first terrazzo flooring in Belgaum and learnt some interesting stories of their family too. The walk culminated at the Congress Well Garden imagining the space during the 1924 Indian National Congress session presided by Mahatma Gandhi. Extended conversations continued over refreshments with the participants, making a great start to a Sunday. The walk was led by Conservation Architect Prajakta Deshpande.

HERITAGE WALK@75: EAST ZONE & NSC SBH

Beadon Street: Shared Heritage and **New Perspectives**

30 October 2022

Beadon Street is one of the oldest and most important roads in Northern Calcutta. It was built by the British in the 1860s in order to link the Chitpur area with the upper circular road in Northern Calcutta. It has a rich history and there are several lanes and by-lanes which form its offshoots.

The locality around it is often perceived as an upper caste Hindu Bengali para (neighbourhood). However, a deeper exploration reveals different layers which have contributed to its making. This includes certain shared elements such as a strong Scottish influence. There are diverse indigenous elements too.

This walk was jointly organized by East Zone and NSC Shared Built Heritage in order to unravel these various layers and shed new light on this less explored locality.

Some notable locations covered during the walk were Scottish Church Collegiate School



and Duff Hostel, Peary Charan Sircar's House, Bhola Nath Dham, Holy Child Institution, Scottish Church College, Satyen Bose's House, Hedua Park, Bethune School & College, W.C. Bonnerjee's House on Ramdulal Sarkar Street, Christ Church, Minerva Theatre and Chaitanya Library. The walk saw participation from ICOMOS India and non-ICOMOS members respectively.

Paper title: Value-based assessment of built heritage: A study of historical markets in Bengaluru

Name of the author/ICOMOS member – Roshini M

Designation: Assistant Professor, School of Architecture, REVA University.

The third biennial conference on VALUE BY DESIGN, Metagreen Dimensions 2022, featured sub-themes such as Sustainability, Livability and Resilience of Asian and African cities, Design for Social Innovation, Conservation and Documentation of Built Heritage, Building Performance, and Green Platform: Pedagogy, Process, and Policies.

The paper aimed to help readers understand the importance of value-based assessment in heritage conservation. Heritage values can be used to make informed decisions about an object or location, as well as to determine the level of significance of an asset. They also help to understand the origins and evolution of a location, as well as who values it. This study used a case-study approach to understand Bengaluru's origins as a 16th century market fortress town, and it discusses the various values that can be attributed to the heritage markets (pre-colonial and colonial), as well as their character and significance to the city.
